Rev Jim Wallace - Ministry at St Enoch's

After several years of declining numbers attending worship at St Enoch's and sadly depleted finances in 2010 Presbytery appointed Jim Wallace to be moderator for the re-settlement board at St Enoch's.

The board considered a few names suggested to become the fulltime minister and after several meetings and much discussion it was learnt that Jim Wallace could be interested in filling the vacancy. Jim was duly inducted as the minister early 2011.



From the first day it became obvious that Jim had boundless energy and with much encouragement from his wife Laurelle, he quickly grasped the urgent needs of the congregation as well as the material needs of the buildings. His ability to visit numerous parishioners almost daily, combined with meetings of session and managers as well as hospital visiting was soon very evident. The attendance and interest in the worship services and activities at St Enoch's became increasingly well attended. The appearance of younger families and the regular Sunday school for the children was a breath of 'fresh air' for St Enoch's.

Finances began to improve, the need to modernise the old hall as well as general maintenance of church and manse also benefited from Jim's energetic participation in all aspects of the needs of the church and people.

Jim frequently joined the group of voluntary workers who spent every Saturday morning resurrecting the old hall to the modern looking, very usable building it is today.

The addition of an intern in 2015 under Jim's guidance was a major step forward in Christian faith.

Jim left in October 2018 for a well-earned retirement and left St Enoch's a much strengthened community of Christians than it was previously. He will be missed.

We are better for his time with us.

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Recently I was led to the small book that concludes the Old Testament, with its message to the errant Israel by a programme on the Hope Channel on Sky.

The book is God's message as given through Malachi; written after the return of Israel from the Babylonian exile after the temple was rebuilt and worship re-established.

"In tithes and free-will offerings. You are under a curse - your whole nation - because you are robbing me. Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this says the Lord Almighty" and see if I will not throw open the flood gates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will be not enough room to store it--"

The Pastor who was leading the programme said that God had told him that today the issue was with the free-will offering where

people were losing sight of how God used His blessings in getting His will actioned for the good of the people.

Remember how your giving can be multiplied by joining of many gifts together, how in some giving schemes the government or other body extends the power of your gift 2 fold, 3 fold,. At St Enoch's if you put your donation in your numbered offering envelope it will be added to your total for your tax return where the IRD returns you a third of your annual donation total. 
Remember that the mission of the church is not only the passion of the 'Good News', but meeting the needs of the people so that God's will may be given more power by the action of your giving however much that may be.



William Gray Memorial Church

On a picture perfect Saturday afternoon the 1st of October 2016 on Tanna Island (Vanuatu) I had the privilege to lead the Waisisi Presbyterian congregation in worship. We gathered in the ruins of the William Gray Memorial Church, covered with blue tarpaulins. The surroundings did not seem to



impact on the deep-felt worship, expression of their faith and the hospitality shown. God whispered into my heart that the rebuilding of this church in Waisisi (meaning 'The Way is Easy) will bring hope, encourage faith, will be an example of the Body of Christ caring for each other, and have significant missional value, while I was standing in front of the brothers and sisters you can see in the photo.

Under the leadership of Rev Kenneth Calvert the church was built in 1974 by volunteers of the New Hebrides Missionary Association from New Zealand.

In the wake of cyclone Pam (March 2015) only three of the church's walls and a few beams remained intact. The congregation faithfully continued to serve the Lord. As this place of worship has great significance, they have been praying and working to restore or replace the church. At that stage, this financially poor community has managed to save enough to buy 10 lengths of roof iron. This is remarkable seeing most members of the community lead a subsistence life and was still working hard to restore their food gardens after the devastating storm.

Neville Jones (PCANZ Global Mission Project Manager in Vanuatu), in consultation with the community, costed the

rebuilding of the church at NZ\$36,500.00. I saw the enthusiastic endorsement of the project by the Global Mission office and the Kaimai Presbytery as God's confirmation and I started to raise funds.

God's blessings upon the building project in Waisisi through the generosity of many people, churches and Presbyteries, were amazing. Donations came from individuals, congregations (including St. Enoch's), the Matama Mission in Motion group and even from as far afield as the Evangelical Presbyterian Church in the USA. Every dollar was going to encourage the faith of a small congregation who has been praying for a long time that God may restore their beloved William Gray Memorial Church. A very generous donation from Cambridge Union Church stirred deep emotions and gratitude for God's goodness through his people.

The Waisisi community was hugely encouraged by the support of their brothers and sisters in New Zealand and they enthusiastically started the rebuild towards the end of last year, after huge ground works was done manually. There was no labour cost as the local people volunteered their time and expertise to build the church. People in the community with building experience gained in Vanuatu, Australia and New Zealand took the lead and the whole community got behind the project. All the blocks were made using sand from the beach hauled up the hill in bags, and the two moulds that were available. Everything done manually. Great care was taken to strengthen the structure as much as possible to withstand the

next big cyclone. The effect of acid rain created by the active volcano, Mount Yasur (about 15km away), had to be taken into consideration as well.

The process was not straight forward or easy.



Neville Jones ordered and bought material in Port Vila after receiving the list from the builders. When possible, the material was shipped to the Tanna 'port'. I guess it would be about a tenhour sailing. From there local 'trucks' transported the material across the island to Waisisi. In March 2018 Cylone Hola damaged the road down to Waisisi and everything had to be carried down to the site for about a month.

It was a great privilege to spend the first week of July with the community of Waisisi. The generous and warm way in which we were welcomed into the community was inspirational. The way in



which everybody engaged with the build blew me away! One of the many people from the community who helped build the church, told me: "When people ask us: 'How are you able to build such a big church?', we answer them: 'God is doing it." And that is true. God orchestrated the project and used many people and churches

to uplift, enthuse and inspire the very isolated community of Waisisi. The project did not only enable them to build themselves a church, but gave them hope, strengthened their faith, was a strong witness to those without a relationship with Jesus Christ, and enabled new imaginings of growth and making a difference in their community.

The church was commissioned on the 25th of August 2018 before the Presbyterian Church of Vanuatu's General Assembly started on the 26th just up the hill from Waisisi.

Jonah Robert writes: "On behalf of Moderator and the Congregation of Waisisi Presbyterian Church, we greet you all Master's greetings. We want to share our deepest heart of appreciation, for what you have done for us. We thank God Almighty for the seeds planted in your heart, Rev, and also extended to other hearts, for the financial assistance to supporting the New Church building, 10m x 20m. We have nothing to give in return but our sincere prayer that God will double portion you his blessing from heaven above. Once again, a million thanks for supporting us, in one way, or the other. Before

we end, we also wanted if we continue our relationship between both of us, strong in future to come."

The congregation has already established a committee whose task it is to work towards putting in a ceiling and maintaining the building.
